## Horseman Dashes Into Hotel, Seizes Bridegroom—But Read on

Thrilling "Abduction" in Foley Lobby Proves to Be a Regulation  
Hook 'em Cow Stunt—J. W. Condon, Young Husband,  
Member of Famous Carnival Club.

A horseman last night spurred his steed through the door and into the lobby of the Foley hotel, Seventh and Jackson streets, while a reception in honor of Mr. and Mrs. William Condon, married at the Cathedral yesterday morning, was in progress.

The horseman headed his mount directly towards the bride, formerly Miss Mary Foley. As he was about to snatch the bride from the crowd, her husband quickly stepped between them to shield his wife from the invader. Not to be outwitted the lone rider caught Condon in his grasp, swung his horse about and rider and victim disappeared through the door.

### Volley of Shots Greet Rescuers.

Men in the lobby rushed to the door to prevent the abduction, but were forced to retreat by a volley of shots from more than fifty revolvers, grimly grasped by an equal number of horsemen waiting outside.

While the intruders held the would-be rescuers at a distance, Condon,

despite his vehement protests, was tied securely to a hayrack. The vehicle, with its unusual cortege of shooting, howling horsemen, started up the street, a source of wonder to pedestrians.

### Bride's Father Seized.

Condon finally was released to re-join his bride at the hotel after a careening ride about town.

Daniel E. Foley, proprietor of the hotel, and father of the bride, was captured by the horsemen and taken to Central station. In the bailwick he was placed in a cell.

After being given time to think it over Foley was taken before a mock court and fined a box of cigars and then released.

It developed later that the horsemen are members of the Hook-em Cow carnival club of South St. Paul, led by William (Coffee) Egan. Mr. Condon also is a member.

After the release of the bridegroom the couple left for the East on their honeymoon.

The end of the hottest week since 1913 was recorded today when the sun climbed out of bed at 5:24 A. M. and sent the mercury to 73 at 6 A. M., the highest early morning temperature of the year so far.

At 9 A. M. the temperature had reached the 78 mark, and it is expected to climb to 90 above before the day ends. Forecaster J. N. Ryken says that the day is cooler than yesterday because the humidity is less.

### No Comfort to Sweltering.

Sweltering pedestrians, after gazing at the thermometers, went their way feeling that humidity had nothing to do with hot weather.

The humidity of the air yesterday was 91, while today it is but 79, Forecaster Ryker says.

St. Paul has been one of the hottest cities in the United States in the week ending today, according to the reports. Phoenix, Ariz., wins in the heat race, the temperature there yesterday was 106 above.

## HAISELDEN, "BOLLINGER BABY" PHYSICIAN, DIE

Chicago, June 19.—Dr. Harry Haiselden, who won international note because of his decision not to operate in an effort to save the life of a child known as the "Bollinger baby," is dead at Havana, Cuba, according to word received here. The Bollinger case which attracted
