

*Here's how Gov. Mark Dayton and the Republican-controlled legislature's budgets, which were passed earlier this year and vetoed by Dayton, differ.*

*Since he offered his initial budget, Dayton's agreed to an additional \$1.8 billion in spending cuts, but hasn't detailed what he'll trim. Meanwhile, since they passed their spending bills, the GOP has said it will shift \$200 million in tax cuts to spending on education and public safety.*
